

In the Gospel of Matthew, we encounter a profound moment where Jesus asks his disciples a critical question: "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" (Matthew 16:13). The disciples share various opinions circulating among the people: "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." However, Jesus then poses a more intimate question to his closest followers, the one that resonates deeply with each one of us today: "But who do you say that I am?" (Matthew 16:15)

In this simple yet profound inquiry, we find an invitation to reflect on our own personal relationship with Christ. Who is Jesus to us? How does he feature in our lives, in our joys, struggles, and everyday experiences?

Each one of us has a unique story of encountering Jesus in our lives. For some, it may be through the witness of a loving family member or a compassionate friend. For others, it may come through the beauty of nature, a moment of profound stillness, or a powerful moment of prayer.

Our journey with Christ is a tapestry of experiences, challenges, and graces woven together. As we grapple with life's complexities and uncertainties, we find comfort in knowing that Jesus walks with us every step of the way. In our diverse encounters with Christ, we discover different facets of his personality and teachings. He is the healer who mends our brokenness, the teacher who imparts wisdom, the savior who redeems us, and the friend who never abandons us.

The encounter with Christ transforms lives. Through the sacraments, the word, and the community of believers, individuals encounter the living God and find solace, purpose, and belonging.

As we reflect on this gospel passage, let us take a moment to ponder our response to Jesus' question. Who is Christ in our lives? How has he made a difference in our journeys? May we embrace this ongoing encounter with Jesus, allowing his love to shape and guide us as we strive to be his faithful disciples, witnessing his love to the world.
